And this culminated in a successful Games both on the field of play as well as off, with many strong performances and podium results, while also being a strong showcase to celebrate the athletes and their stories with some of the best Parapan Am coverage yet across Canada.

A significant example of the power of inclusion, our second strategic pillar, was the launch of

our Paralympic Performance Recognition program. One of the biggest and most important steps towards equity for Paralympic athletes in this country, Paralympians will now receive a very deserved financial reward for winning medals at the Games like their Olympic counterparts. This milestone was a long time coming and is proof of how much Paralympic sport has advanced in recent years.

The above are two major examples of important work that was done throughout 2023-24 with so many other initiatives happening along the way. You will read about many more of these through the pages of this report.

YEAR IN REVIEW TOP HIGHLIGHTS

- Canada captured a total of 52 medals nine gold, 15 silver, and 28 bronze at the Santiago 2023 Parapan Am Games, finishing sixth overall in the standings by total medals. More information on the Canadian Parapan Am Team's performance highlights can be found later in this report.
- At the Santiago 2023 Parapan Am
 Games, qualification spots were earned
 for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games in
 the sports of Para archery, boccia, and
 goalball.
- In addition to being an important Paris 2024 qualification opportunity and high-performance competition, the Parapan Am Games was also a successful simulation for Paris 2024, with key lessons to be applied for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games.


- CPC also leaned into its leadership
 within the Americas at the Santiago
 Games, hosting an Americas
 Paralympic Committee gathering, in
 addition to participating in the General
 Assembly of the APC membership.
 - Accomplished Paralympians Josh
 Vander Vies (boccia) and Karolina
 Wisniewska (Para alpine skiing) were
 announced as Canada's co-chefs de
 mission for both the Santiago 2023
 Parapan Am Games and Paris 2024
 Paralympic Games, marking the first
 time the chef de mission role is shared
 by two individuals. The duo began their
 role ahead of and during the Santiago
 Games, providing their valuable
 expertise as part of CPC's leadership
 team, offering support and guidance
 to athletes, and acting as spokespeople
 for the Canadian Parapan Am Team.



- Coverage of the Santiago 2023 Parapan Am Games across the CPC digital channels, CBC/Radio-Canada streaming, as well as general media coverage, was some of the highest quality yet for a Parapan Am Games. This resulted in strong social media numbers for CPC's platforms, including:
 - Added 2K new followers
 - 2,440 social media posts
 - 3 million impressions
 - 161K engagements
- Partners engaged with the Parapan Am Games which included attending a virtual 'Live from Santiago' event which enabled employees at home in Canada to be integrated into the Games.
- Pfizer Canada demonstrated its
 commitment to Para sport by having senior
 leadership attend the CPC's hospitality
 program at the Parapan Am Games and
 were title sponsors of the Health Services
 Team reception. In addition, Pfizer
 continued its fellowship program which saw
 a Pfizer employee join

- the CPC's Communications team on the ground in Santiago.
- Planning and preparation intensified for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, and CPC hosted its final NSO site visit in Paris in January. Early planning and preparation also took place for Milano-Cortina 2026 and Los Angeles 2028.
- CPC provided \$625,000 through 2023-24 to Own the Podium for Enhanced Excellence funding to supplement current Sport Canada support towards Paris. This was part of CPC's plan to give much needed additional support to NSOs for Paris 2024 preparation.
- Several grants were allocated to NSOs to support Games performance planning, classification, and equipment. Investments included:
 - Games Performance Planning –
 \$138,331 to support 12 projects by
 11 NSOs including pre-Games staging
 camp scouting, familiarization, test
 event, and Paralympic Games
 qualification support

- Classification \$100,200 to support
 16 projects by 12 NSOs linked to
 international and domestic athlete
 classification, hosting classification,
 and classifier training
- Equipment \$47,150 to support nine projects within eight NSOs for equipment enhancements to targeted summer and winter athletes

IMPACT STORY:

NSO SUPPORT HELPS MAKE DIFFERENCE IN GAMES PREPARATION

GAMES PERFORMANCE PLANNING

Success at the Paralympic Games is no accident – it's the result of meticulous planning and preparation. CPC supported several NSOs in the year leading up to the Paris 2024 Games to support planning initiatives. This included providing \$9,750 to Canoe Kayak Canada to support its participation at the 2023 Paris World Cup, a test event for Paris 2024. This was a critical event to attend to understand the nature of the logistics and discover the best setup for the team at the Paralympic Games, all of which was instrumental to its performance in Paris.

CLASSIFICATION

Classification is an integral aspect of Paralympic sport, but can be expensive

and distracting to athletes training for competition and preparing for important events. The classification grants allowed NSOs to prioritize classification where it best fit for athletes.

For example, a total of \$15,000 was granted to Swimming Canada to organize classification at the Ken Demchuk International Invitational, which gave an additional 11 classification spots at a crucial moment in the quad – and most notably allowing Reid Maxwell, Sebastian Massabie, and Hannah Ouellete to be classified properly and become eligible for the Paris

2024 Paralympic Games. Meanwhile, \$8,000 was allocated to Athletics Canada to send three athletes, including Cody Fournie, to the Dubai Grand Prix in February to complete classification. Getting this done earlier in the season allowed Fournie to entirely focus on his Paris preparation from there.

EQUIPMENT


Para sport equipment is often extremely individualized and adapted, based on an athlete's abilities, and thus can be rather expensive. But, proper equipment can make all the difference in an athlete's performance, and in them feeling their best.

Equipment grants awarded through 2023-24 directly went towards supporting athletes and their performance goals, such as the \$4,000 granted to Cycling Canada to purchase a road time trial bike frame for Alex Hayward or the \$2,900 allocated to Triathlon Canada for a carbon wheelset for Leanne Taylor, enhancing her aerodynamics.

- A total of \$2 million of Next Gen funding, with the matching of Sport Canada, was also provided to 18 NSOs.
- Recognizing the importance of coach and technical leader development, CPC funded the Pursuit program with \$182,789 to support and enhance Canada's high performance coaches and technical leaders in their pursuit of excellence in Paralympic sport.
- CPC promoted the health and wellbeing of its participants by enhancing the role of Chief Medical Officer (CMO) to work on system improvements in addition to leading in the Games environment. Dr. Andrew Marshall, CPC's CMO, has worked to ensure that the Para perspective is considered when discussing and implementing new programming in Canada.
- CPC also continued to support the role of a mental health lead, held by Susan Cockle, not only to ensure that team members were supported for the Parapan Am Games but also to support the development of mental

- health resources to enhance the sport system.
- CPC continued to support the Canadian
 Anti-Doping Program by contributing
 \$10,000 to ensure that all athletes
 attending the Parapan Am Games had
 access to education around anti-doping
 and to support the testing of athletes
 before departure for the Games.
- Eighteen organizations across Canada received grants from the 2023-24
 Paralympic Sport Development Fund for a total distribution of \$200,000. The funds, provided by the Paralympic
 Foundation of Canada (PFC), were used for a variety of projects to enhance Para sport development at the local, regional, and provincial levels, including purchasing equipment, building coaching capacities and skill levels, establishing new programming, recruiting new athletes, and providing more competition and training opportunities. The PSDF has now granted more than \$1.3 million to sport

organizations in Canada over the past eight years and remains an important part of CPC's commitment to foster an inclusive Paralympic sport system in Canada.

IMPACT STORY:

PSDF GRANT GROWING WHEELCHAIR FENCING OPPORTUNITIES

Paris 2024 Paralympian Trinity Lowthian is a leader at TRYumph Gymnastics Academy in Ottawa, a 2023-24 Paralympic Sport Development Fund grant recipient for its wheelchair fencing program.

With its \$10,000 grant, the program was able to purchase equipment, including frames for chairs, blades for swords, seat cushions, wheelchair straps, and fencing aprons. Funds also went towards more training opportunities for athletes and coaches at the club.

"These opportunities gave us a lot of knowledge and know-how of how to implement it back in the community," said Lowthian. "With that and the equipment, we were able to recruit a good group of people to start Para fencing and then go from there."

Lowthian says the participants are seeing the benefits of being physically active while enjoying a unique sport.

Everybody, regardless of ability, deserves an opportunity to have a sport to participate in

"Everybody, regardless of ability, deserves the opportunity to have a sport to participate in," she said. "Not only does it build community, but I find personally sport and staying active, the benefits are beyond anything physical, including the mental and emotional benefits. And there's also the life skills and beyond that sport provides."

- ParaTough Cup, PFC's signature fundraising event, enjoyed its most successful season to date in 2023-24, raising over \$510,000 to support Para sport development in Canada. More than 400 participants came together across the four events to try out Para sports and support the Paralympic Movement:
 - Vancouver (presented by lululemon) raised more than \$115,000, a new record for the Vancouver edition
 - Montreal (presented by Pfizer Canada) raised more than \$170,000, a new record for a single ParaTough Cup event



- Calgary (presented by Petro-Canada) –raised more than \$85,000
- Toronto (presented by Canadian TireCorporation) raised more than \$140,000
- Recognition program, one of the most significant milestones for the Paralympic Movement in Canada ever. Paralympians will now receive financial recognition for podium performances at the Paralympic Games \$20,000 for gold, \$15,000 for silver, and \$10,000 for bronze. This recognition, made possible through an initial endowment created by the Paralympic Foundation of Canada, will begin at the Paris Games and continue for each Games thereafter, and is equal to the amount Olympic athletes receive for the same achievements. IMPACT STORY:

WORKING TOGETHER WITH ATHLETES

Together with athletes is one of the key accelerators of CPC's new 10-year strategy and athlete leadership is critical to advancing Paralympic sport across Canada. Throughout 2023-24, athlete engagement and involvement was present in many different areas of CPC's work – including as staff, consultants, interns, and volunteers – making a real difference in moving forward key initiatives and ensuring the correct decisions are made to best serve athletes and foster a safer, inclusive sport system where all participants can be at their best.

The Canadian Paralympic Athletes' Council is at the helm of so much significant work and it was very active through the year, focusing on key areas such as representation, AAP funding and greater support for athletes with high support needs as well as safe sport. Members of the council have also been extremely active through

various appointments on many committees and councils within the Canadian sport system in order to represent Paralympic interests. The Athletes' Council includes: chair Erica Gavel, vice-chair Jeremy Hall, Amy Burk, Ina Forrest, Tyler McGregor, Abi Tripp, and Mike Whitehead.



If I've been having a blast, it's been a revelation to share similarities and differences from my career with other athletes.

Athletes, both current and retired, continue to make a difference as leaders on CPC's Board of Directors, including Michelle Stilwell and Cindy Ouellet as well as Chelsey Gotell and Josh Dueck through their position on the IPC Governing Board and IPC Athletes' Council,

respectively, and Erica Gavel and Jeremy Hall through their roles on the Athletes' Council.

Many athletes also have leadership roles within their NSO or other sport organizations, with roles on other athlete councils.

Para alpine skiing team, Paralympian Mac
Marcoux also joined CPC's full-time staff in
the role of Coordinator, Athlete Engagement
in February 2024 where he has already made
an impact in work communicating directly
with athletes. Paralympians Mike Sametz and
Mike Whitehead, who joined CPC as interns in
2022, also continued working with CPC
though parts of the year, in their roles on the
Foundation and Sport teams, respectively.

CPC's coverage of the Santiago 2023 Parapan Am Games was greatly enhanced by Paralympian Andrea Nelson, who joined CPC's Marketing and Communications team for the Games as a host/interviewer, speaking with athletes post-competition and helping bring the stories of the Canadian Parapan Am Team and atmosphere of the Games back to Canadian audiences.

- CPC officially released its ambitious new 10-year strategy, focusing on two key areas – providing Canadian athletes, coaches, and staff with the best preparation and optimal, healthy environments for Paralympic Games excellence, and showcasing the power of Paralympic sport to impact a more inclusive and accessible society. More information on the strategy can be found later in this report.
- Following the release of the 10-year strategy, work began to build out a power of inclusion and social impact strategy, focusing on how sport can promote and influence inclusive societies, and develop an action plan. This will be launched in early 2025.
- Significant work continued on developing CPC's new brand, which was released later in 2024.
- CPC enhanced its social and digital coverage of several important Para sport events, with staff onsite to cover the 2023 World Para Ice Hockey Championships in Moose Jaw, Sask., 2023 World Para Swimming Championships in Manchester, England, 2023 UCI Cycling

- World Championships in Glasgow, Scotland, and the 2024 Para Nordic World Cup Finals in Prince George, B.C.
- CPC's marketing and communications
 efforts resulted in significant growth across
 our digital and social platforms:
 - 9.8 million impressions across social channels (24.6% increase over previous period)
 - 373K engagements (53% increase over previous period)
 - Added 6K new followers (95.1% increase over previous period)
- Athlete Content & Media Summit, featuring two days of content capture in Toronto with CPC, CBC/Radio-Canada, media outlets, and corporate and sport partners. The summit is a key opportunity to bring together athletes to meet with media and broadcast stakeholders, as well as gather CPC content to be rolled out through the year.
- CPC piloted the development of bespoke content for partners, which led to greater

- promotion of athlete stories and the ability to share collaboratively on CPC and partner channels.
- CPC continued working closely with its commercial partners, who are committed to supporting Paralympic sport and shining a spotlight on Paralympic athletes.

- Partners demonstrated their commitment to diversity and inclusion, with notable examples including:
 - CPC facilitated a webinar alongside
 Portage, our Official Supplier, on Digital
 Accessibility during Disability
 Employment Awareness Month which aimed to highlight the importance of web accessibility in enhancing inclusivity within the sports domain. The webinar was shared with our Commercial and Sport partners.
 - Partners demonstrated commitment to championing inclusion within their workplace by engaging employees with initiatives such as ParaTough Cup and other Para sport experiences.
 - Pfizer Canada demonstrated our shared value of equity by financially supporting a Paralympian to intern with CPC (Mike Whitehead) and celebrated this initiative during National Disability Employment Awareness month.

- Partners continued to evolve their own initiatives which support Paralympic athletes and the CPC vision:
 - lululemon collaborated with
 Paralympians to introduce new
 accessible elements into the
 Paris 2024 Team Canada kit.
 - Petro-Canada maintained its support for the FACE program that gives grants to up-and-coming athletes and their coaches from across Canada.
 - Bell continued its commitment to
 connecting the country's top athletes
 via their Bell Athletes Connect program.
 In addition, they celebrated their
 program's athletes by hosting them at a
 Toronto Raptors Game in February 2024
 - Through their ParaTough Cup.
 fundraising as well as internal campaigns such as 'One Hour at a Time' and 'Fasken Blitz', Fasken donated almost \$150,000 to PFC.

SANTIAGO 2023

The first Games to be held without pandemic restrictions since the last Parapan Am Games four years earlier, Santiago 2023 proved to be a successful event for Canada and an exciting opportunity to experience a full festive Games atmosphere.

Working alongside the competing NSOs and sport partners, CPC was able to successfully simulate plans for Paris 2024 and learn where to adapt while also fostering a healthy high-performance environment which allowed athletes and coaches to focus on their performances.

There were several strong results in Santiago. Led by co-chefs de mission Karolina Wisniewska and Josh Vander Vies, the Canadian Parapan Am Team fielded a roster of 135 athletes including competition partners, competing in 14 sports. The team's overall medal total was 52. Podiums were achieved in 11 different sports: Para athletics (12), Para cycling (12), Para swimming (10), boccia (6), Para badminton (4), wheelchair basketball (2), goalball (2), Para archery (1), Para table tennis (1), wheelchair rugby (1), wheelchair tennis (1)



PARAPANAM TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

PARIS 2024 QUALIFICATIONS WERE SECURED IN THREE SPORTS:

The women's goalball team qualified for the Paris Games with gold, defeating USA in the final for the Parapan Am title and ticket to Paris. Additionally, Canada earned quota spots in boccia BC4 pairs thanks to Alison Levine and Iulian Ciobanu's gold medal, as well as the men's individual compound in Para archery following Kyle Tremblay's bronze medal.

PARA CYCLIST ALEXANDRE HAYWARD WAS CANADA'S MOST SUCCESSFUL INDIVIDUAL ATHLETE with four medals (21-1), two on the track and two on the road. He and Levine both led the way for Canada in gold


THE NEXT CHAPTER IN CANADIAN PARALYMPIC SPORT:

UNVEILING CPC'S 10-YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN

In 2023, CPC launched a new 10-year strategic plan, charting a clear path for growth, resilience, and transformation. This priority emphasizes building a performance-focused environment that supports athletes in both their preparation and well-being. By investing in training, resources, and a culture of excellence, CPC aims to ensure that athletes are fully prepared for their journey to the Games, creating an environment where they can thrive and achieve at every stage.

THE POWER OF INCLUSION

CPC seeks to promote disability inclusion, not only in sport but in broader society, by building accessible sport environments and increasing awareness around the capabilities and diversity of people with disabilities.

Through this priority, we will highlight how sport can positively impact and influence disability inclusion in communities across the country and focus on ensuring that each athlete and sport participant feels welcomed and supported at every level of their journey.

COLLABORATIVE PROCESS FOR TRANSFORMATIVE CHANGE

The development of CPC's strategic plan was a rigorous, inclusive process focused on capturing diverse perspectives to build a responsive and sustainable future for Paralympic sport. The planning process unfolded over a 13-month period, with four main stages shaping the strategy:

1. Understanding the Environment

CPC began by analyzing the current sport landscape and identifying the unique challenges and opportunities faced by the Paralympic community. This involved gathering data to highlight gaps in the existing system and making informed decisions on areas needing immediate focus. Community members and partners contributed valuable insights that helped CPC understand Paralympic sport from multiple perspectives.

2. Engagement and Group Discussions

CPC recognized the importance of collaboration and engaged a broad group of community members in structured discussions. By involving athletes, coaches, sport partners, member organizations and leaders from other sectors, CPC ensured the plan reflects the priorities of the entire community. These discussions also helped apply lessons from health, education, and social equity to the complex challenges in sport, further enriching the strategy with perspectives from beyond the field.

3. Identifying Critical Focus Areas

Based on the insights gathered, CPC synthesized key themes to define critical focus areas for the next decade. This phase involved questioning existing practices and challenging assumptions, allowing CPC to pinpoint where innovation or change is needed most. By taking a forward-thinking approach, CPC is better equipped to adapt to emerging needs and trends in Paralympic sport.

4. Reimagining the Paralympic Sport System:

The final phase involved envisioning a sustainable, inclusive future for Paralympic sport in Canada. Through a structured visioning exercise, CPC looked at how the sport system could evolve to better serve athletes and communities. Inspired by the concept of "build back better," this phase focused on establishing a framework for

This comprehensive process has set a strong foundation for an inclusive, sustainable Paralympic sport system that can adapt to both current and future challenges.

GUIDING VALUES FOR THE JOURNEY AHEAD

Throughout this journey, CPC's core values — Collaboration, Belonging, Accountability, Joy, and Excellence—served as guiding principles. These values define how we approach our work, from building connections within the Paralympic community to celebrating the achievements of Canada's athletes. They ensure that each step forward aligns with our vision for a supportive and inclusive sport culture that inspires all Canadians to see themselves as part of this journey.

THE PATH FORWARD: BUILDING TOGETHER WITH OUR COMMUNITY

To achieve our strategic goals, CPC has identified five "Accelerators" that will drive this work forward: Together with Athletes, Innovation, Working Collaboratively, Leadership and Influence, and People and the Environment. These Accelerators are designed to move us closer to a Paralympic sport system that is bold, resilient, inclusive, and purposedriven, a system that reflects the very best of Canada.

As we look ahead to the next decade, CPC is committed to creating an inclusive, world-leading Paralympic sport system that unites Canadians of all backgrounds and abilities.

Together, we are building a future where every athlete can pursue their dreams, reach new heights, and thrive in a sport environment that values excellence, integrity, and joy.

SETTING AMBITIOUS GOALS FOR CANADIAN PARALYMPIC SPORT:

PFC'S IGNITE CAMPAIGN TO MAKE BIG IMPACT

Looking ahead at the next 10 years of the new strategy and the goals CPC sets out to achieve, it's clear more funding and resources will be needed. And so, in 2023-24 the Paralympic Foundation of Canada (PFC) launched the \$35 million IGNITE campaign - the largest-ever initiative to empower the Paralympic Movement in Canada.

PFC sees a future where Canadians with a disability are offered ample opportunities to experience the transformative power of sport and strives to support diverse champions that inspire belief in the potential for greatness. This will help shape communities across Canada that are healthy and inclusive spaces where every person with a disability feels a sense of belonging and inclusion.

A NEW HIGH FOR EQUITY IN CANADIAN PARALYMPIC SPORT:

LAUNCHING PARALYMPIC
PREFORMANCE RECOGNITION


January 24, 2024 was a historic day for the Paralympic Movement in Canada – and a celebration that was a long time coming.

Against the backdrop of the Ottawa River at the Canadian Museum of History in Gatineau, Que., the Canadian Paralympic Committee announced its Paralympic Performance Recognition program to reward Paralympic Games medallists.

In a significant step forward towards equity for Paralympic athletes, Paralympians will now receive \$20,000 per gold medal, \$15,000 per silver, and \$10,000 per bronze won at each Paralympic Games, starting with Paris 2024. This is the same amount earned by Canadian Olympians.

"This is the cumulation of years of work to create a more equitable, inclusive space for Canada's Paralympians to compete," said Marc-André Fabien, CPC President. "For many years, CPC has been focused on developing a system

that is fair and effective by investing in athlete development and strengthening Canada's Paralympic Movement.

"We have made significant advancements in support of Paralympic sport in recent years, and a performance recognition program was the next major priority to ensure athletes receive both the resources they need to continue competing, and the recognition they deserve for their dedication and accomplishments on the world stage."

The program was made possible through an initial \$8 million endowment (starting with \$4.04 million with plans to raise the full \$8 million) created by the Paralympic Foundation of Canada, with lead donor Sanjay Malaviya contributing 50 per cent of the funds through the Malaviya Foundation. Malaviya, who has been a leader in supporting the Paralympic and Olympic Movements in recent years, is matching a \$2 million investment from the federal government.

An additional \$2 million is still to be raised, with Malaviya also committed to matching this amount. The Malaviya Foundation's total contribution of \$4 million is one of the most significant donations in Canadian Paralympic sport history.

In front of a crowd of Paralympic athletes, members of the sport community, and media, Paris 2024 co-chef de mission Karolina Wisniewska oversaw the proceedings as emcee, which saw Fabien, CPC CEO Karen O'Neill, PFC executive director Dean Brokop, Malaviya, and recent Paralympic medallists

Aurelie Rivard, Priscilla Gagne, and Nicolas-Guy Turbide speak to the initiative and celebrate the monumental moment for Paralympic sport.

The launch of Paralympic Performance
Recognition, one of the most significant
announcements ever in Canadian Paralympic
sport, is an immense acknowledgement of how
far Para sport has grown in this country,
including an increased dedication to equity and
inclusion and a brighter spotlight on the value
and quality of Paralympic sport – a testament
to the athletes and the work they have done to
push Paralympic sport forward.


And athletes were now able to prepare for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games knowing their winning performances would be valued the same as those of Canadian Olympic medallists.
